From the President's Desk

This time of year we usually mention something about the arrival of kitten season, and how busy we're going to be. But last year the kittens never stopped coming! We have had kittens in our foster homes without a break since last spring. Now the new crop is arriving, and we barely had a chance to sit down and catch our breath.

One of the most rewarding and important missions we have at ARCF is socializing kittens born to feral cats. If left to roam and breed, these kittens would create many generations of unsocialized cats, who quickly become unwelcome in most communities. If taken to a shelter, the kittens would almost certainly be destroyed because the resources are not available to house and care for them, especially since there are so many fully socialized cats and kittens flooding the shelters already.

We have an extraordinary team of "kitten boot camp" volunteers who take these wild little things into their homes, and with patience and skill, turn them into playful, purring balls of fur.

In March, volunteers from the New York City Feral Cat Initiative visited Portland to present a workshop on feral kitten socialization. Nine of our volunteers attended, and we all agreed it was a great learning experience and very entertaining too. Even our most expert kitten tamers came away with new ideas. Thank you Anne, Courtney, Debbie, Eric, Lori, Paul, Val, and Wilma for giving up yet another Saturday morning for the kittens!

We are always looking for more volunteers to join our kitten team—there is no shortage of kittens needing our services! If you're interested in helping, please contact us. We have the training, supplies, and resources; all we need is your time and some space in your home. It doesn't take much.

Mostly because of those winter kittens, who were quickly adopted, we were able to place 26 cats in the last three months. Of course it's always more challenging to find homes for our wonderful adult cats. A recent rescue involved a group of eight cats left behind when their human family was evicted from the house. The cats were obviously loved, because they are very sweet, and extremely outgoing and affectionate. Carly is one of that group, and so is Audrey, our cover girl. Let us know if you are looking for a well-mannered lap cat who will charm all your friends!

Our other projects this quarter include helping PAW Team clients Rocko, a Chihuahua, and Sugar, a Dachshund, two little dogs in desperate need of many dental extractions. We also helped Cookie,

a Border Collie/Springer who needed surgery to remove painful bladder stones, and Romeanna, a senior kitty who also needed some painful teeth removed.

Several years ago, we helped TNR (trap-neuter-return) a colony of about 15 community cats being cared for by residents of an RV park in the Portland area. One day in March, we happened to drive by and were shocked to see every trailer was gone, and the park was in the process of being demolished. Our sinking feeling was confirmed when we took a walk through the deserted park and saw half a dozen cats sitting by their empty food bowls. We talked to the surrounding businesses, got permission from the property owner, and started feeding the cats daily. Then our intrepid trapping team went into action, and the cats are all now safely in our care, where they will stay until we find them a safe and permanent location to live out the rest of their lives.

We are sad to report the untimely demise of Marvin, a gentle giant of a cat we rescued when his owners moved and left him behind—the far-too-familiar story. Marvin was with us only briefly before he died suddenly of what we later learned is a heart condition common to the Maine Coon breed.

In happier news, we were proud to learn we have fans in Mr. Todd Graham's fourth grade class at Stephenson Elementary School in Portland. This group of enterprising young scholars won a cash prize in a fundraising contest for their PTA. They were allowed to decide how to spend their prize money, and they chose to donate to ARCF. Thank you, Stephenson students, and we hope to meet you soon!

In closing, let us climb up on our soapbox yet again to say: Please spay and neuter all your pets. Make sure your friends and family do the same. If you are feeding stray cats, get them fixed now. We love puppies and kittens, but there are way too many of them for the homes available. If you or someone you

know needs financial or logistical help getting this accomplished, please call us.

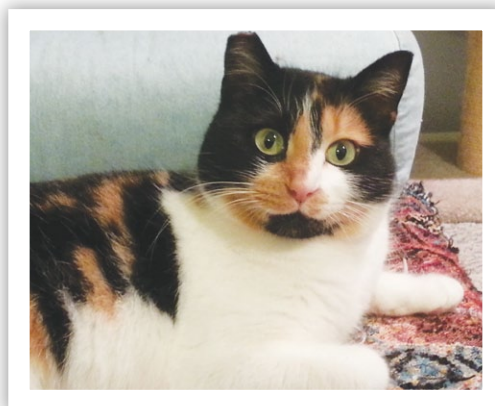

Blue

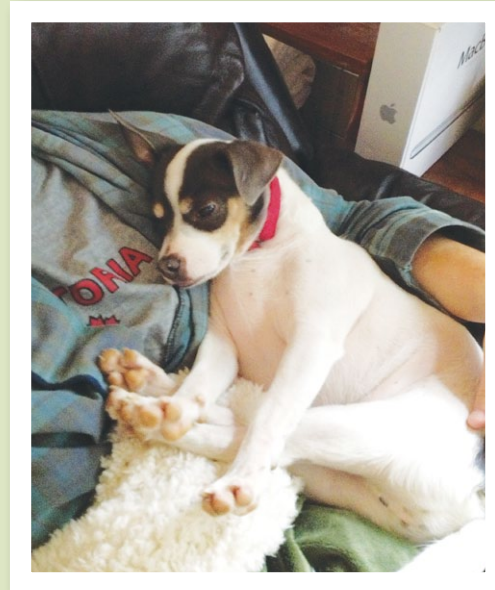
Our regular readers will remember Blue from our winter issue. He was the adorable (but chubby!) Chihuahua with a sweet, shy personality. He had come to My Way Home Dog Rescue in April 2012, after being picked up as a stray and taken to a local shelter. We don't know anything about the first five years of his life before he came to us, but gradually we learned what kind of home was best for Blue, and it turned out to be the home of Kris Grogan and Michelle Rogers, his My Way Home foster parents.

We decided a low-traffic home with no kids would probably be the best fit for Blue, and fortunately we fit the bill. I remember the day he arrived. It was just he and I outside and he was very scared. I sat down on the driveway, leaning up against the fence and just waited for him to come to me. It took quite a while and I was glad it was a nice, sunny day. After about two hours, he finally approached me and we've gotten along like gangbusters ever since.

After a few weeks of feeding him small portions and twice daily long walks, his weight was not going down. He seemed tired and he had almost no hair on his chest. I suspected a thyroid deficiency. We had him tested for hypothyroid and found he was low-normal. We started him on medication and the pounds just melted away. He weighed 17.6 lbs when he came here. He is now holding steady at right around 14 lbs. He has a waist, definition in his hind legs and no more fatty neck roll! That is an enormous weight loss for a dog his size, almost 21%! He has so much more energy, gets sudden

nitro-bursts on walks, and is just a very happy little dog.

Also, since day one he has been my number one snuggler at bedtime. He sleeps on my left side, snuggles his little face into my neck and makes little snorty noises as he falls asleep. If he were a cat, he would be a Ragdoll because he goes limp and lets you put him in whatever position you want when he's in your lap. He is so affectionate and sweet.

Blue gets along great with the other dogs and never makes trouble. He is very interested in our cat and makes sure she doesn't forget she lives in a house with seven dogs.

We adopted Blue because we fell in love with him and couldn't imagine our pack without him. When I come into the room and sit down, he jumps right up on my lap and gives me tons of kisses before I even know what's going on! He is an oxytocin machine! 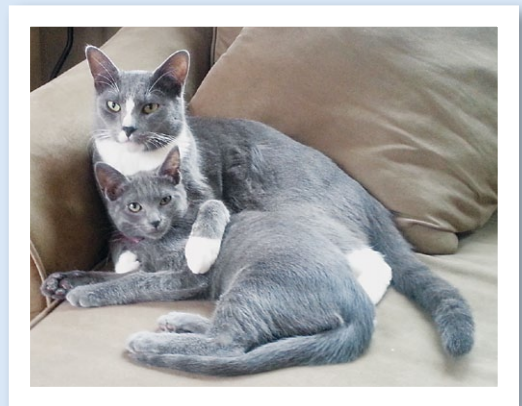

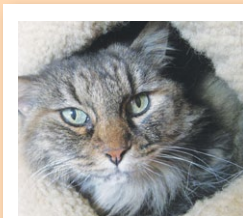

Carolyn McAlear sent us a donation in memory of Ellsworth and Emily, brother and sister cats she adopted from ARCF in 1993.



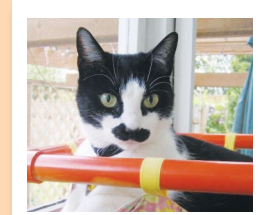
BONNIE

Under the care of our vet, blood tests showed that Bonnie suffered from hyperthyroidism and would need daily medication. Bonnie went to live with our foster volunteer Nell Brownell. Her physical wounds healed, but we learned that Bonnie was understandably anxious about many things in the world. She had other health issues, including asthma and seizures. In spite of all that, Bonnie won Nell's heart, and she decided to adopt her. Gradually Bonnie's health continued to decline and in February came the point where there were no more good days and Nell made the humane but heartbreaking decision to end her suffering.

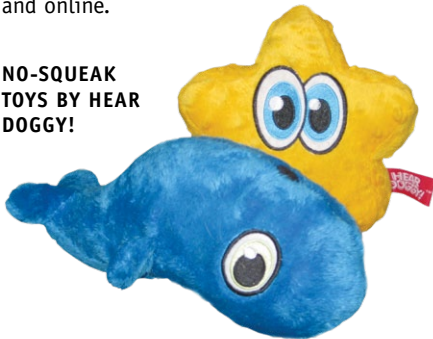
THINGS WE LIKE

FUR Dry™ - The Wet Dog Solution

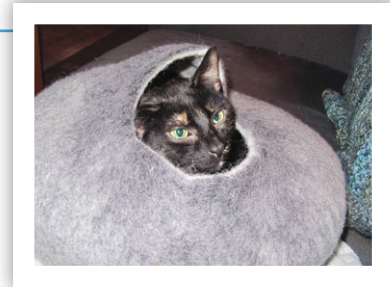

Felted Wool Cat Beds
